



Jolly Phonics uses the synthetic phonics method, which means that the letter sounds are taught first, on their own. Children are then taught to blend sounds together to say ('synthesise') the word.

There are five basic skills for reading and writing, each of which are incorporated within the Jolly Phonics program.

What a daily phonics lesson looks like:

Jolly Phonics has always focused on direct, explicit instruction of phonemic awareness and phonics for both reading (decoding) and writing (encoding). Each lesson begins with a story to strengthen phonemic awareness and encourage vocabulary development. The program teaches the students to say the individual sounds and blend them into a word for reading; for writing, the students listen for the sounds in a word and then write the letter(s) that represent those sounds and so spell the word. From the start, the lesson plans provide explicit direction and practice in letter formation and introduce segmenting and writing words at an early stage. As their letter-sound knowledge increases, the students are able to blend and segment more and more words automatically, as well as developing and extending their comprehension skills.

The Jolly Phonics Teacher's Book contains a set of structured daily lesson plans, which correspond to the daily activities in the Jolly Phonics Pupil Books. The sample lesson plan below is for the letter sound /r/.

It contains all the information the teacher needs to deliver their lesson, from introducing the letter sound, a variety of multi-sensory methods to practice blending, as well as segmenting practice and further activity ideas.

1. Lesson Objective

The letter sound of focus for this lesson.

2. Flashcards

The letter sounds previously learnt, that should be quickly revised with flash cards before introducing the letter sound /r/.

3. Storyline

An engaging way of introducing the letter sound and the action that will be used. 3

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4. Action

The action - from the story - to accompany the letter sound for multisensory learning.

5. Letter Formation

How to introduce the written version of the letter sound.

6. Blending

Practice how to blend the letter sound, using the accompanying sound sheet.

7. Sounding

Practice listening for the letter sound /r/ in a variety of words.

8. Word Bank

A selection of simple words for children to practice blending with the new letter sound and previously learnt letter sounds.

Letter Sound /r/

Plashcards: Review the letter sounds already taught: /s/, /a/, /t/, /i/, /p/, /n/, /c/, /k/, /e/, /h/.

Introducing the letter sound: Use a story such as the one below, along with the action.

Robert's family has a playful new puppy, but they cannot decide what to call him: Rocky, Rebel, or Rover. It is raining, so the puppy follows Robert up to his bedroom to play. The puppy sniffs around the room and finds a racing car, a rocket, some roller skates, a toy rabbit, and a rocking horse. Then he goes under the bed and pulls out an old blanket. He grips the blanket in his teeth and shakes it from side to side: "Rrrrrr!" "Rrrrrr!" Robert tries to take it away, but the puppy hangs on tightly until the blanket rips into rags. "Oh no!" says Robert, holding the blanket up. "Well, I know what to call you now." And from that day on, the puppy is known as Rags.

Action: The students shake their heads, like a puppy with a rag, making a continuous /rrrrrr/ sound.

Letter formation: Explain how the letter for /r/ is written. The students form the letter in the air and then practice writing $\langle r \rangle$, $\langle p \rangle$, $\langle n \rangle$, $\langle c \rangle$, $\langle k \rangle$, $\langle e \rangle$, and $\langle h \rangle$ in their books. They write over the dotted letters and then try again, using the starting dots.

Blending: Blend the words on the lesson page with the class: *rip, rat, rest, trap.* The students point to the dot underneath each sound as they say it.

Identifying the sounds: Look at the four pictures at the bottom of the lesson page. Say the word for er one with the class. The students listen and write letter for the first sound in each word [rain, rabbit, hen, rocket].

Word bank: ran, rap, rat, rip, rack, rent, rest, risk, trap, trek, trip, crack, press, prick, track, trick, crept, crisp, print, scrap, strap, strip, stress, spirit, strict; cracks in a pan. Use the word bank regularly to practice blending. It can also be used to do auditory segmenting: Say a word and then sound it out with the class, holding up a finger for each sound.

and the words *rip* and *rat*. Remind the students that the sound /c k/ can be written as a caterpillar /c/ or a kicking /k/. Afterward, sound out each word for the students, writing the letters on the board so that they can check their work.

Developing accuracy and fluency: The students take home a sound book to read with their parents and bring back the next day.

Further ideas: Sing the /r/ song from Jolly Songs. Paint pictures of rockets. Use pieces of rag to make a dog collage. Pin up the /r/ section of the Wall Frieze.

The sound sheet provides children with the opportunity to practice both blending and letter formation, whilst the inclusion of the action allows children to gradually build up a bank of all the letter sounds.

The image and description of the action for the letter sound.


14. Letter Formation Practice

Practice blending the new letter sound with a few simple words that include previously learnt letter sounds. The dots underneath indicate the number of sounds in each word.

4. Tips for Teachers


Accessed by pressing the question mark in the right corner of the screen, these are available for every slide to explain the objective of each slide. These are printable, either individually or for all slides, to help the teacher easily prepare the lesson.

5. Action The image of the action that accompanies the letter sound (and ties in with the story / Jolly Song).

Jolly Classroom

After a quick revision of previous letter sounds, and the introduction of the new letter sound /r/, children are given the opportunity to see and practise the letter formation.

There are then multiple activities, which can be done as a class on the whiteboard, and printed for individual use later, to reinforce learning whilst practicing blending and segmenting skills. All of these slides are supported by printable teacher's notes so that the lesson is easily planned with everything the teacher may need!




6. Letter Formation

Shows the direction the pencil needs to move to correctly write the letter. Child can follow this and practice individually.

7. Blending

An activity for practicing blending. A series of flashcards are displayed, with sound dots underneath. There is also an option to hear the word spoken aloud.



8. Toolbox

A toolbox in order to interact with the slide and navigate within the software. This is available on every slide of each lesson.

9. Segmenting

An activity for practicing segmenting. A selection of images are displayed showing decodable words. They must then segment the sounds in each word and write the individual letter sounds in the spaces provided underneath.



10. Printable Worksheets

Printable worksheets are available throughout the lessons. The teacher can print class sets of these so that each child can work individually after the initial lesson on the whiteboard as a whole class. It also allows children to build up their own bank of letter sounds. The Jolly Phonics Handbook contains a page of teacher's notes for each of the 42 letter sounds. The sample lesson plan below is for the letter sound /r/.

1 Letter Sound: /r/

Flashcards: Review the letter sounds already taught: /s/, /a/, /t/, /i/, /p/, /n/, /c/, /k/, /e/, /h/.

Storyline: A boy has a playful new puppy. The puppy is exploring the boy's room and finds an old blanket next to some roller skates. He grips the blanket in his teeth and shakes it from side to side: "rrrrrr!" The boy tries to take it away, but the puppy hangs on tightly until the blanket rips into rags. The puppy has a name now: Rags!

Action: The students shake their heads, like a puppy with a rag, making a continuous /rrrrrr/ sound.

- **Letter formation:** Explain how the letter for */r/* is written. The students form the letter in the air. Then they practice writing the letter on their sound sheets. They write over the dotted letters and then try again, using the starting dots.
- 6 **Blending:** Blend the words on the sound sheet with the students: *rip, rat, rest, trap.* The students point to the dot underneath each sound as they say it. More words from the word bank can be written on the board for extra blending practice.
 - Identifying the sounds: This activity is for aural segmenting only. Look at the three small pictures on the sound sheet. Say the words and then sound them out with the students, holding up a finger for each sound: r-u-g, r-ai-n, r-a-bb-i-t. Say the sounds again, pointing to the dots under the words. Do some more segmenting, using short words from the word bank.

Word bank: ran, rap, rat, rip, rack, rent, rest, risk, trap, trek, trip, crack, press, prick, track, trick, crept, crisp, print, scrap, strap, strip, stress, spirit, strict; cracks in a pan.

Sound sheet: Encourage the students to form the letters correctly and to color the pictures neatly when completing the sound sheet.

10 Listen and write: Call out the sounds /r/, /h/, /e/, /c k/ and ask the students to write the letter for each one. Remind them that the sound /c k/ can be written as a caterpillar /c/ or a kicking /k/. Then call out the following words: *rip, rat.* For each one, ask the students to listen for the sounds and write the word. Afterward, sound out each word for the students, writing the letters on the board so that they can check their work.


Further ideas

- Sing the /r/ song from Jolly Songs.
- Paint pictures of rockets.
- Use pieces of rag to make a dog collage.
- Pin up the /r/ section of the Wall Frieze.

10. Listen and write Practise how to listen and write our sounds and words. **11. Further Ideas** Suggestions for activities to reinforce the new letter sound. As well as the page for teachers, each letter sound in the Jolly Phonics Handbook is accompanied by a sound sheet that can be photocopied for every child in the class. Jolly Phonics Flashcards




Picture Flashcards: On one side of the flashcard is the letter sound /r/ with a simple word written underneath that contains this letter sound. On the reverse of the card is a picture relating to the word, with dots which indicate the number of sounds in the word.

Jolly Phonics Cards: includes a flashcard with the letter sound /r/ as well as many regular word blending cards that contain this letter sound. It also includes flashcards with alternative vowel spellings and tricky words.

Jolly Phonics Workbooks

The workbook has a full page on the letter sound /r/ which includes a shortened version of the story to introduce the action - which is also included at the bottom with a description - along with an accompanying picture. On the adjacent page there are several activities including letter formation practice and words to blend.

In total, there are 7 workbooks covering all of the 42 letter sounds, including alternative spellings of vowels.



Jolly Phonics Decodable Readers





They provide a range of activities and stories to keep children engaged as they revise the letter sounds taught at school.




Finger Phonics Books
